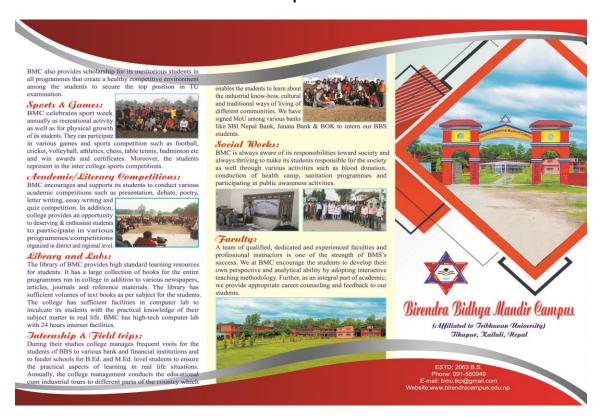

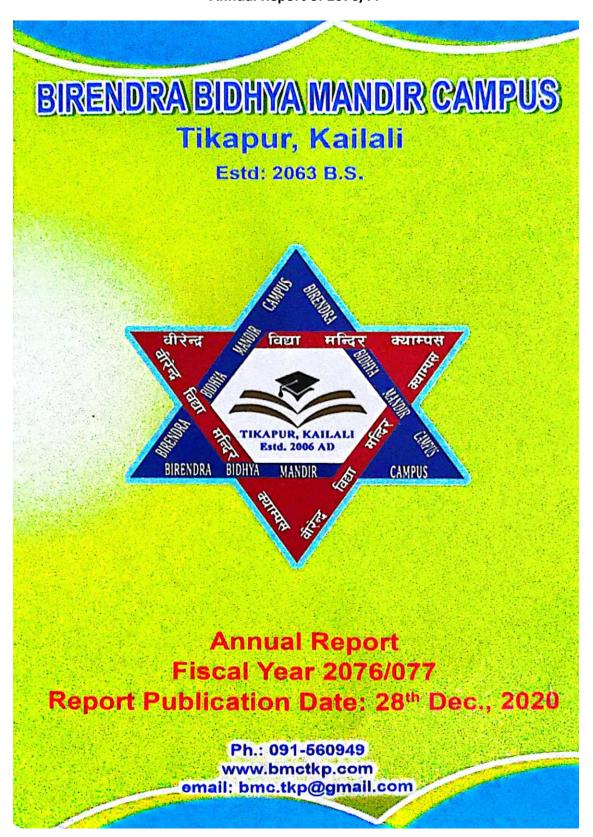

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Executive Summary

The Annual Report of 2076/077 is a full-fledged annual depiction of BMC foregrounding the major academic and fiscal activities with their certain issues and challenges as faced throughout the year and plans to mitigate them in forthcoming years. The report aims to provide a quality education maintaining a transparent academic, infrastructural, financial, and administrative record of the Campus, properly. The analytical report of academic progress, physical progress, financial progress, social progress, some salient issues and challenges and the budget plan have found out some certain keys as satisfactory result, and graduation, inadequate and not properly managed infrastructure, deficit budget mutual co-relationship between campus and society and the challenges regarding quality education and financial sustainability. It has equally marked out some measures to be taken to face the challenges as-expansion of programmes and new faculties, adopting advance technological pedagogy, and searching for alternative financial resources. BMC is selected for the Higher Education Reform Project (HERP) by the University Grants Commission (UGC), with the aim of improving the quality of higher education. Now, BMC has entered into the QAA cycle to impart quality education, to make BMC a leading institution and to identify strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats.

The required information during the preparation of the report are gathered from the Audit Report of 2076/077, Academic Calendar, Annual Work Plan, administration and the Strategic Development Plan(2017-2022) of the Campus using mainly primary data. The report comprises mainly nine chapters with their analytical explanations. They are Background Section, Academic Progress, Physical Progress, Financial Progress, Audit Observations/Issues and Steps Taken to Mitigate the Issues Raised by Audit Observation in the Last Fiscal Year, Social Progress, Issues and challenges, Annual Work Plan and Budget of the Last Three fiscal Year and Projected Annual Work Plan and Budget of the Three Fiscal Years Following the Current Fiscal Year. The Annual Report 2076/077 will likely be exceeded and supported in the reduction of the pinpointed issues and challenges; if the contribution of stakeholders and other supporters are increased.

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1. Background

Birendra Bidhya Mandir Campus is an emerging community campus, established in 2063 BS, with the collaborative efforts of local people comprising academically aware intellectuals, businessmen, social workers and guardians. This autonomous, non-profitable academic institution is situated at the heart of Tikapur Municipality, Ward number 1, Block D, Kailali. It is affiliated to Tribhuvan University and at present offers bachelors' Programmes in management and education and post graduate programmeme in education. Since its inception, it has been imparting quality education to the most marginalized and backward community of the country in the far-west Nepal; to bring positive societal change and development through academic excellence. It is managed by Birendra Bidhya Mandir public Educational Trust.

The campus' history goes back to 2031 BS along with the establishment of Tikapur town by Late KhadgaBahadur Singh, the pioneer of academic sensibility of the contemporary Tikapur. Began in 2031 BS, as the only community school in the far-west, BirendraBidhyaMandir reached to campus level in 2063 BS and has now up to post-graduate Programmes in the service of the society. Started with meager 99 students in one building having 12 rooms, has now 940 students with two storied four buildings having 40 rooms; in one Bigha 18 Katha (12950 Square meters) campus premises. The campus is also in the process of registering other 25 Bighas in its name from its mother organization, BirendraBidhyaMandir Secondary School.

It is located at the heart of well-planned Tikapur municipality, ward number 1, block D, Kailali district, Sudur Paschim Province. It is about 200 meter west to Khadak Chowk of Lamki Tikapur road, 14 KM from Mahendra Highway. It is in a pollution free, peaceful, spacious and ideal place for academic activities. The campus is an easy accessible higher educational destination for many neighbour localities like Munuwa, Durgauli, Janakinagar, Pathariya of Kailai district as well as neighbouring districts such as Bardiya, Accham, Doti, Kalikot, Dailekh, Bajhang, Bajura, Darchula and Jumla.

BMC is an autonomous community campus managed by campus management committee (CMC) as apex body whose

chairperson and members are selected from among the donors, social workers and guardians. Campus chief, teachers' representative and students' representative are also the ex-officio member of CMC. It is responsible to formulate and implement plans, policies and Programmes in the interest of the campus and the society. The campus has its own regulations approved by CMC. All the internal bodies of the campus are formed by CMC and IQAC of the campus in accordance with the provision made under regulations, bye-laws and operational procedures. There is provision of Board of Trustee (Guthee) as ceremonial body to coordinate the different activities of school and campus. As an umbrella body, it has the sole responsibility of preservation, protection and distribution of resources between school and campus on the basis of need and rationality. Furthermore, all the rules and regulation of the campus are to be ratified by the Board of Trustee which are made and approved by CMC for their implementation.

The campus has designed the operational procedures (OP) that specifies the defined job responsibilities and rights of different internal bodies, portfolio members and working units following the campus regulations. All the academic, administrative and financial activities are governed and regulated by the regulations and bye-laws & guidelines formulated under it. Thus, the campus' regulations, bye-laws and the operational procedures are the main charters that state, define and regulate different provisions, rules and regulations in a systematic and practical way to achieve prime goals and objectives of campus catering all inclusive and up-to-date quality education for all.

Moreover, BMC aims to provide a quality education in a reasonable fee. Its limited income has also been used for upgrading physical facilities along with staff salary and regular operational costs. The Akshyakosh of 2 crores has been deposited for sustaining the institutional existence of BMC. It indeed, wouldn't have been in this position today if there hadn't been such an energetic team work. This shows that the campus is in a progressive order. However, it has many things to do especially to meet all the modern needs and desires of the people with their advanced facilities. And surely, it takes some years to manage all modern facilities, expanding programmes and faculties

to impart quality education in an affordable fee.

There are, Altogether 30 teaching and non-teaching staff have been working in this campus. It offers adequate scholarship to meritorious, under privileged and needy students annually. It has obviously been contributing a huge role to attain inclusiveness in education, a prerequisite to sustainable development.

2. Academic Progress

Started with meager 99 students in one building having 12 rooms, has now 940 students with two-storied four buildings having 40 rooms; BMC at present offers Bachelor Level Programmes in Management and Education and Masters level programmeme (M.Ed.) in English and Nepali. It is going to launch MBS and BA as well very soon. The campus has emerged as a place of educational destination for the students as an academic excellence and active participation in various social Programmes. Since BMC is a sole TU affiliated campus in this locality; it has a good flow of students for higher education. Of the total students' population 67.87 percent are girls and approximately 46.28 percent students are from socially and economically disadvantaged sections of the society like Tharu, Freed Kamaiyas, Dalits and others. More than 10.5 percent students come from remote places of Sudurpashim Province to pursue their higher education to BMC.

The annual report of 2076/077, comprises the programmes and level wise Enrolment Trend Analysis, Pass Rate Trend Analysis, Graduate Trend Analysis of the last three years (2074/075, 2075/76, 2076/77) focusing on female and educationally disadvantaged students as academic activities. Teaching learning activities, proper assessment of students and the optimum utilization of extra classes and the classes even on leave time by the dedicated and experienced teachers are some typical remarks raised by the report. The detail explanation of the academic progress branching off different sub-topics is as follows.

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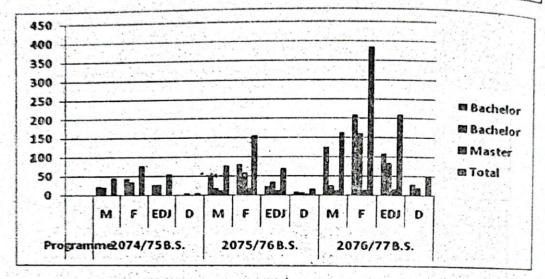

2.5 Educational Pedagogy

BMC has formed the examination Sub-committee with its ToR to conduct internal assessments and examinations periodically to evaluate the overall performance of the students.

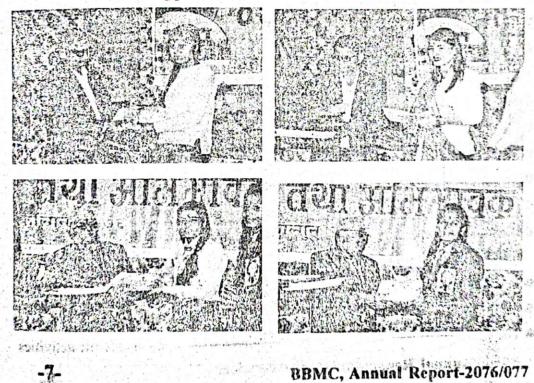

3. Physical Progress:

BMC has its own fully fledged master plan indicating the existing building and projected expansion in the future. It plans to meet the need for augmenting the infrastructure to keep pace with academic growth under its Strategic Development Plan (SDP) and master plan. We have adequate infrastructure facilities having two-storied four buildings with 40 rooms. There is a provisions of construction of academic building, administrative block, E-library and hostel under SDP which is approved by CMC. Moreover; BMC completed the construct of one classroom, paving the entrance path, basketball court, compound wall and renovation of toilet during last fiscal year with the support of UGC under HERP. 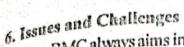

The Annual Report 2077/078 is a full-fledged annual depiction of Birendra Bidhya Mandir Campus foregrounding the major academic and fiscal activities with their certain issues and challenges as faced throughout the year and plans to mitigate them in forthcoming years. The report aims to provide a quality education maintaining a transparent academic, infrastructural, financial, and administrative record of the Campus, properly. The analytical report of academic progress. physical progress, financial progress, social progress, some salient issues and challenges and the budget plan have found out some certain keys as satisfactory result, and graduation, inadequate and not properly managed infrastructure, deficit budget, mutual co-relationship between campus and society and the challenges regarding quality education and financial sustainability. It has equally marked out some measures to be taken to face the challenges as-expansion of programmes and new faculties, adopting advance technological pedagogy, and searching for alternative financial resources. BMC was selected for the Higher Education Reform Project (HERP) by the University Grants Commission (UGC) with the aim of improving the quality of higher education and successfully completed it. Now, BMC has entered into the QAA cycle to impart quality education and completed its preparatory assessment visit of Peer Review Team, We hope that the institution will get QAA certificate soon. We are trying our best to make the campus a leading institution identifying its strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats.

The required informations during the preparation of the report are gathered from the Audit Report of 2077/078, Academic Calendar, Annual Work Plan, administration and the Strategic Development Plan(2017-2022) of the Campus using mainly primary data. The report comprises mainly nine chapters with their analytical explanations. They are Background Section, Academic Progress, Physical Progress, Financial Progress, Audit Observations/Issues and Steps Taken to Mitigate the Issues Raised by Audit Observation in the Last Fiscal Year, Social Progress, Issues and challenges, Annual Work Plan and Budget of the Last Three fiscal Year and Projected Annual Work Plan and Budget of the Three Fiscal Years Following the Current Fiscal Year. The Annual Report 2077/078 will likely be exceeded and supported in the reduction of the pinpointed issues and challenges; if the contribution of stakeholders and other supporters are increased.

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1. Background

Birendra Bidhya Mandir Campus (BMC) is an emerging community campus, established in 2063 BS, with the collaborative efforts of local people comprising academically aware intellectuals, businessmen, social workers and guardians. This autonomous, non-profitable academic institution is situated at the heart of Tikapur Municipality, Ward number 1, Block D, Kailali. It is affiliated to Tribhuvan University and at present offers bachelors' Programmes in management and education and post graduate programmesi.e. Master's in Education (M.ED) and Masters in Business Studies (MBS). Since its inception, it has been imparting quality education to the most marginalized and backward community of the country in the far-west Nepal; to bring positive societal change and development through academic excellence.

The campus' history goes back to 2031 BS, along with the establishment of Tikapur town by Late KhadgaBahadur Singh, the pioneer of academic sensibility of the contemporary Tikapur. Began in 2031 BS, as the only community school in the far-west, Birendra Bidhya Mandir reached to campus level in 2063 BS and has now up to post-graduate Programmes in the service of the society. Started with meagre 99 students in one building having 12 rooms, has now 1584 students with 4 buildings having 44 rooms; in one Bigha 18 Katha (12950 Square meters) campus premises. The campus is also in the process of registering other 25 Bighas in its name from its mother organization, Birendra Bidhya Mandir Secondary School. It is located at the heart of well-planned Tikapur municipality, ward number 1, block D, Kailali district, SudurPaschim Province. It is about 200 meter west to Khadak Chowk of Lamki Tikapur road, 14 KM from Mahendra Highway. It is in a pollution free, peaceful, spacious and ideal place for academic activities. The campus is an easy accessible higher educational destination for many neighbour localities like Munuwa, Durgauli, Janakinagar, Pathariya of Kailai district as well as neighbouring districts such as Bardiya, Accham, Doti, Kalikot, Dailekh, Bajhang, Bajura, Darchula and Jumla, Baitadi & so forth.

BMC is an autonomous community campus managed by campus management committee (CMC) as an executive body and campus assembly (CA) as an apex body. The chairman and members of CMC are selected from campus assembly members representing the donors, social workers and guardians. The campus chief, teacher's representative and students' representative are also the ex-officio members of CMC. It is responsible to formulate and implement plans, policies and

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programmes in the interest of the campus and the society. All the internal bodies of the campus are formed by CMC and internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC) of the campus in accordance with the provisions made under regulations, byelaws and operational procedures of BMC. There is a provision of Board of Trustee (Guthee) as ceremonial body to coordinate the different activities of school and campus. As an umbrella body, it has the sole responsibility of preservation, protection and distribution of resources between school and campus on the basis of need and rationality. Furthermore, all the rules and regulation of the campus are to be ratified by the campus assembly which are made and approved by CMC for their implementation.

The campus has designed the operational procedures (OP) that specifies the defined job responsibilities and rights of different internal bodies, portfolio members and working units following the campus regulations. All the academic, administrative and financial activities are governed and regulated by the regulations and byelaws & guidelines. Thus, the campu's regulations, bye-laws and the operational procedures are the main charters that state, define and regulate different provisions, rules and regulations in a systematic and practical way to achieve prime goals and objectives of campus catering all inclusive and up- to - date quality education for all.

Moreover, BMC aims to provide a quality education in a reasonable fee. Its limited income has also been used for upgrading physical facilities along with staff salary and regular operational costs. The Akshyakosh of 2 crores has been deposited for sustaining the institutional existence of BMC. It indeed, wouldn't have been in this position today if there hadn't been such an energetic team work. This shows that the campus is in a progressive order. However, it has many things to do especially to meet all the modern needs and desires of the people with their advanced facilities. And surely, it takes some years to manage all modern facilities, expanding programmes and faculties to impart quality education in an affordable fee.

There are, Altogether 32 teaching and non-teaching staff have been working in this campus. It offers adequate scholarship to meritorious, under privileged and needy students annually. It has obviously been contributing a huge role to attain inclusiveness in education, the prerequisite to sustainable development.

2. Academic Progress

Started with meagre 99 students in one building having 12 rooms, has now 1584 students with two-storied two buildings and three storied two building having

44 rooms; BMC at present offers Bachelor Level Programmes in Management and Education and Masters level programmemei.eM.Ed&MBS. It is going to launch BBM, BBA and BA as well very soon. The campus has emerged as a place of educational destination for the students as an academic excellence and active participation in various social Programmes. Since BMC is a sole TU affiliated campus in this locality; it has a good flow of students for higher education. Of the total students' population 64.46percent are girls and approximately 51.01 percent students are from socially and economically disadvantaged sections of the society like Tharu, Freed Kamaiyas, Dalits and others. More than 10.5 percent students come from remote places of Sudurpashim Province to pursue their higher education to BMC.

The annual report of 2077/078, comprises the programmes and level wise Enrollment Trend Analysis, PassRate Trend Analysis, Graduate Trend Analysis of the last three years (2075/076, 2076/77, 2077/78) focusing on female and educationally disadvantaged students as academic activities. Teaching learning activities, proper assessment of students and the optimum utilization of extra classes and the classes even on leave time by the dedicated and experienced teachers are some typical remarks raised by the report. 2.5 Educational Pedagogy

The activities of BMC relating to teaching learning and evaluation are very clear. The campus provides remedial classes to the educationally disadvantaged and weak students. Following are the salient feature of "Educational Pedagogy" adopted by BMC.

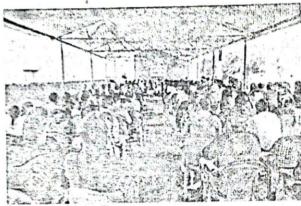

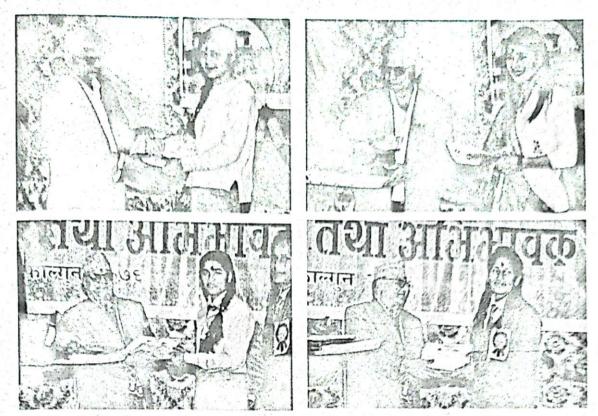

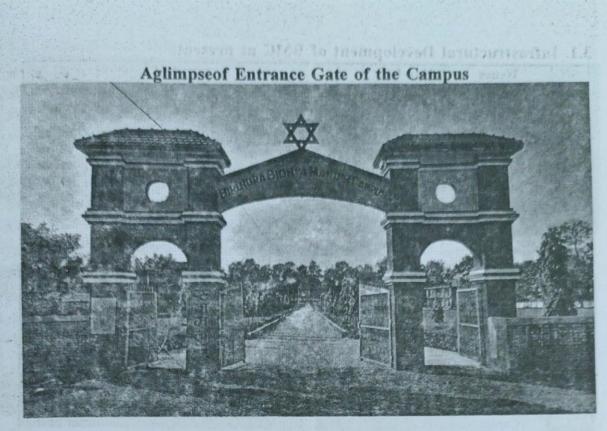
3. Physical Progress:

BMC has its own fully fledged master plan indicating the existing building and projected expansion in the future. It plans to meet the need for augmenting the infrastructure to keep pace with academic growth under its Strategic Development Plan (SDP) and master plan. 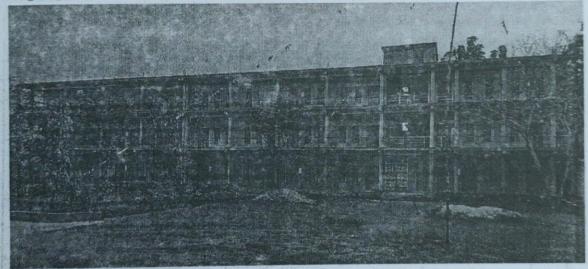
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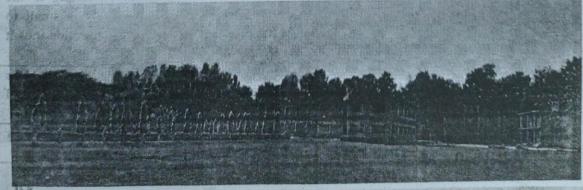

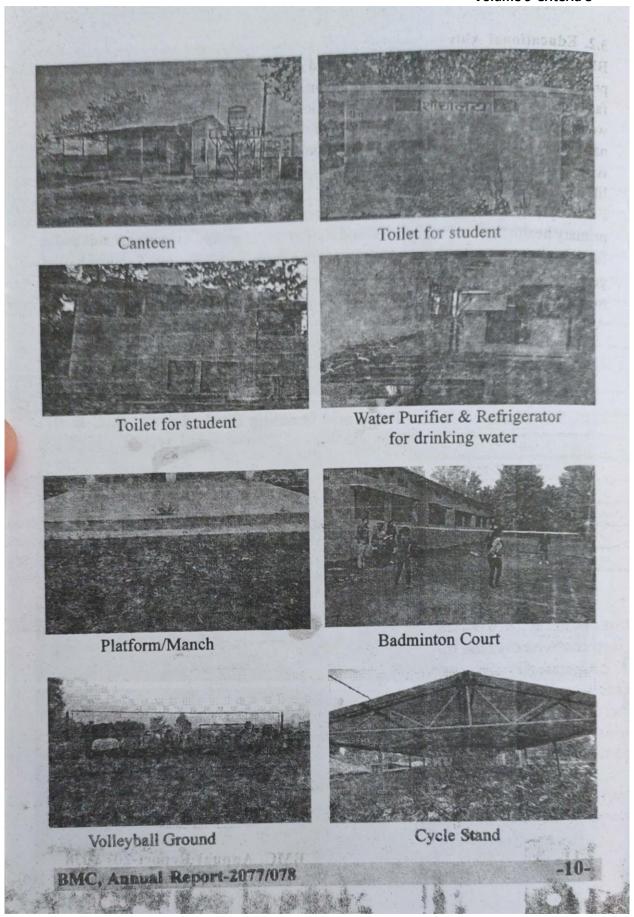


Rightly constructed and Renovated Building Blocks i.e. "A, B, C & D".



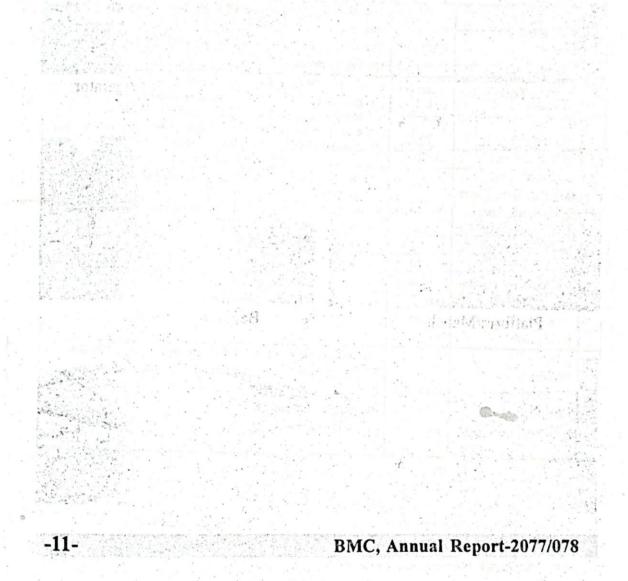


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3.2. Educational Aids

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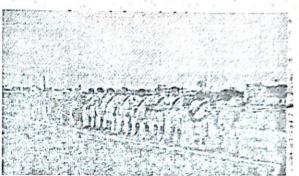

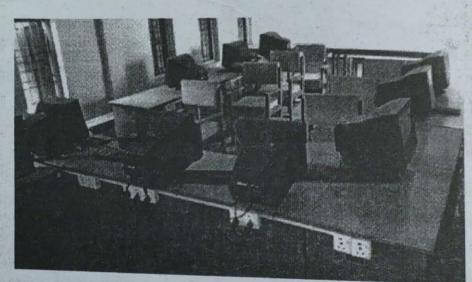

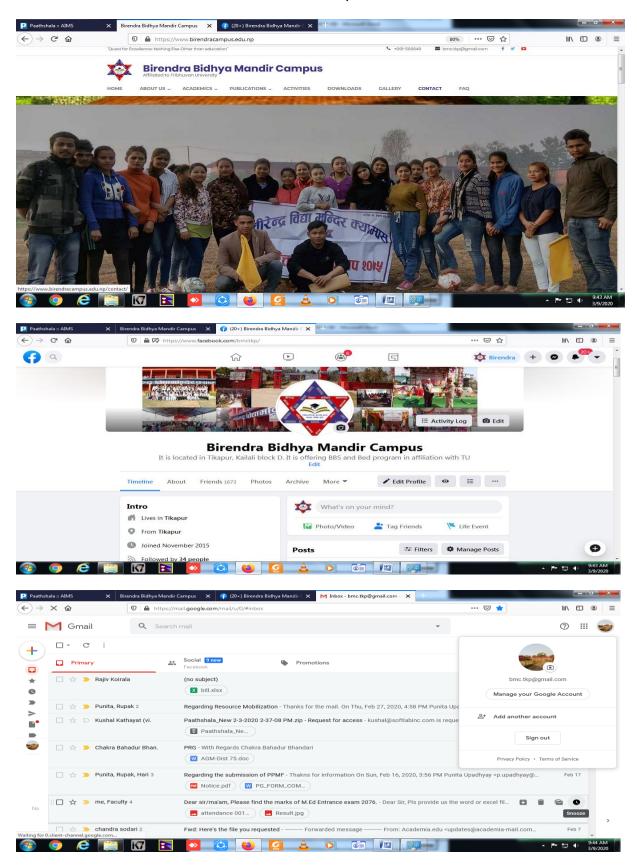
What suggestions would you like to give to the Chief Minister that may play a catalytic role in enhancing education status of this province?

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1. Introduction

The data and information have to be properly and systematically updated, classified analyzed and interpreted to have the actual information making right decisions. An educational institution conducts different academic, financial, infrastructural, administrative activities to have self-knowledge and sharing to the stakeholders. The transparent, systematic as well as responsible educational institution ultimately creates the value of the organization and helps to form the good policies, plans and programs for further improvement. Birendra Bidhya Mandir Campus (BMC) is an emerging institution in the Far Western Province. It is Tribhuvan Univ ersity (TU) affiliated community campus, established in 2063 B.S. in Tikapus, Kailali. It runs Master of Business Studies (MBS) and Bachelor of Business Studies (BBS) programs in management faculty Masters in Education (M.Ed.) and Bachelor in Education (B.Ed.) programs in education faculty. The campus has involved in different educational and non-educational activities for the quality enhancement of the higher education. Therefore, it is necessary to review all the activities, result and outcomes and performance of the institution regularly; adopting the efficient, advanced tools of information measuring system. Basically, most of the activities are related to educational issues from admission to result till pass out period. BMC uses the data and information for the policy formation, planning and estimation to make better decisions. It analyses data and information in different situations i.e. in formal and informal forms. However, the EMIS report is published in formal form, firstly. BMC is at the final stage of Quality Assurance and Accreditation (QAA) certification process of UGN, Nepal. The campus must be aware to impart quality education focusing on students' competency; fulfilling all the quality benchmarks of higher education. Therefore,, BMC has assessed its activities, result, academic, financial, administrative, governance as well as other areas of the institution via this EMIS Report.

2. Objectives

This EMIS report is mainly centered to academic areas like; enrollment, dropout, passout ratio and result etc. Besides, the report covers the financial, administrative, governance as well as human resource aspects too. Its major aim is to assess the academic status of BMC. Following are the major objectives of the report:

- To assess the student flow, enrollment and growth condition, gender dominance
- To map up the students' velocity on the basis of territorial segment
- To observe the student enrollment trend, portfolio and gender and caste dominance.
- To evaluate the examination and its result in perspective of performance of BMC.
- To trace out the drop out as well as pass out ratio.
- To assess the infrastructural adequacy and utilization
- To know about scholarship distribution condition
- To compare the operational status and activeness of the committees and authorities.
- To analyze the scholarship program of BMC
- To point out the availability and adequacy of human resource and student teacher ratio
- To evaluate the financial resources and sustainability of the campus
- To analyze strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (SWOT)
- To disseminate the quantitative educational, financial and administrative progress of the campus

To provide suggestions and feedback to internal quality assurance committee (IOACC).

3. Core Areas of the EMIS Report

This report covers multiple areas of BMC, however, it is focused on fundamental educational data and information identified by the Educational Quality Assurance and Accreditation Council (EQAAC), University Grants Commission (UGC) Nepal and Self Study Report (SSR) of the campus. Following are the major areas of this report:

- Enrollment: Entry and retention level, structure, mapping, gender based distribution, faculty, program, year/semester and batch wise, trend of enrollment
- Examination and Result: Attendance, Pass Out Ratio
- Drop Out Ratio; condition and tendency
- Availability and quality of basic infrastructure and facilities
- Human resource: Student Teacher Ratio
- Financial: budget and expenditure and surplus-deficit and sustainability
- Library: availability of books to students, student book ratio, library visit tendency, mobilization of books

4. Methodology

This report is based on the data and records maintained by EMIS Cell in paathshala software and manual records of the campus administration. All the data and information relating to financial (accounting, expenditure, surplus, deficit, income expenses, asset, liability, fee, budget, scholarship), academics (enrollment, drop out, examination & result, programs) and library (books, visit, issue and return) are fully maintained by Paathshala software. The administrative, non-financial, non-educational activities and other relevant records are maintained manually in different registers and record files. This report has presented the data on the fiscal year wise study period; 2076/77 to 2078/79. However, enrollment data is taken from academic session; 2070/71 to 2078/79. The intensive data analysis is based on the data of the current fiscal year 2078/79. Pathshala software is not enough to provide all types of data and inputs required for the report. Thus, the EMIS team has processed them by using different toolslike; Microsoft excel and Microsoft access software. The preparation of the report was started from Chaitra, 2078. However, it was not completed due to the different technical issues like; covid-19 and some batches were near the end of examination and fiscal year 2078/79 was not finished. It was difficult to analyze the data properly. Finally, it is completed on August, 2022 covering the data upto Ashadh 2079. General data, percentage, growth rate trend, tabulation, bar-diagram, ratio and pie-chart are used for data presentation and analysis of the report.

5. Limitations of the Report:

This report is the first formal attempt of the EMIS Cell of BMC to depict the statistical status regarding educational, financial, administrative and other areas of the campus. Some of the data have found variances to actual data due to omission or commission of the data entry like caste, sex, batches, year/semester and overlapping of batches due to covid-19. EMIS system has maintained the enrollment data from the beginning of the campus from 2063 B.S. Rest of the data are not found fully recorded on software since the Paathshala software was installed 2070 B.S. onwards. There are some technical difficulties in data analysis due to the overlapping, discontinuity of regular batches and covid-19 pandemic. There are some defects of the software that full-fledged data and multi-dimensional statistics and reports are not available in the software at once because it is even in updating as well as developmental stage. Annual and semester-based programs are being overlapped; where the same students were upgraded to next semester. Technically, they are counted twice in a year. However, the team has tried to present

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the report as much as possible to cover all the possible areas with its sincere efforts with less error leading to the reality and relevancy.

6. Statistical Presentation and Analysis

The report has presented the data based on its objectives and core concerned areas representing educational, financial and administrative activities to assess the status of the campus. Following are the statistical views of different areas of EMIS related data of relevant time periods.

6.1 Current Student Enrollment (2078/79)

There are 1931 students enrolled in 2078/79 in different programs from two faculties. Out of them 84 students are of masters' level, 1847 students are from bachelors' level.1328 students are enrolled in the faculty of management, 603 students are enrolled in education faculty, 36 students are from MBS program and 48 students in M.Ed. program. Total enrollment of BBS program is 1292 students and of B.Ed. program is 555 students. The gender wise gross enrollment statistics shows that 614 are male and 1317 are female students enrolled during this period.

The majority students represent from faculty of management. There are 58% students in the faculty of management and 42 % students in the faculty of education.

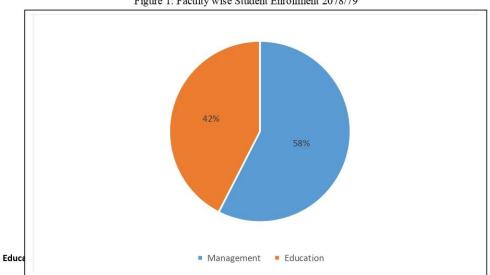
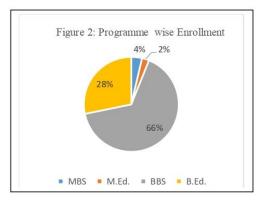


Figure 1: Faculty wise Student Enrollment 2078/79

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6.1.2 Program wise Student Enrollment in 2078/79

There are altogether four programs in BMC; MBS and BBS from management faculty and M.Ed. and B.Ed. from education faculty. There is high volume of the students in BBS program which occupies 66 % of total student enrollment and B.Ed. program has secured the second place with the enrollment of 28 %. Enrollment at masters' level is not so attractive just occupying 4% in MBS and 2% in M.Ed. program out of total enrollment. BBS program seems more attractive in respect of no. of students but in masters level there is less student in MBS program since it is launched recently in the academic session 2078/79; whereas M.Ed. program has completed its first cycle.

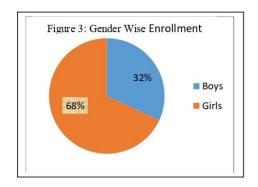


6.1.3 Gender the - wise Student Enrollment in 2078/79

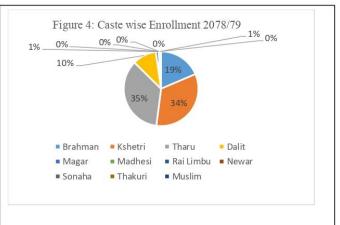
6.1.4 Caste-wise Student Enrollment

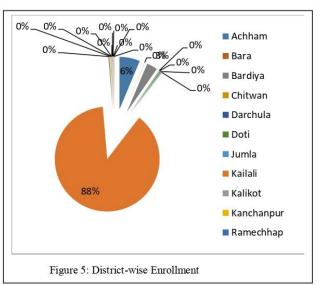


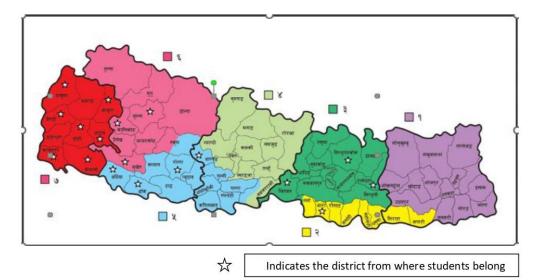
6.1.5 Mapping of Student Enrollment

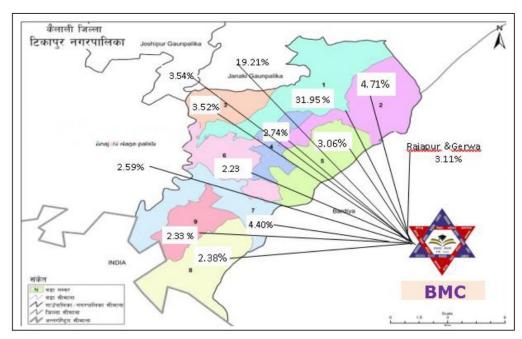


B. Mapping by Student Flow

The campus was established in 2063 B.S. At the beginning, it had nominal no of students in every program, hardly a section could be launched due different reasons. This report has taken

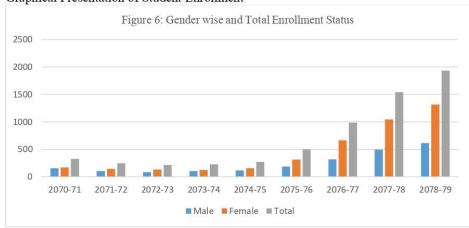
the base time to 2070/71 since the four year BBS program was started from this year and B.Ed. four program from 2072/73

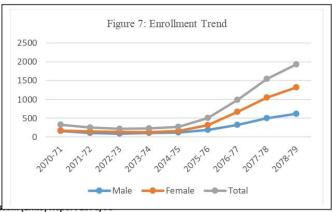

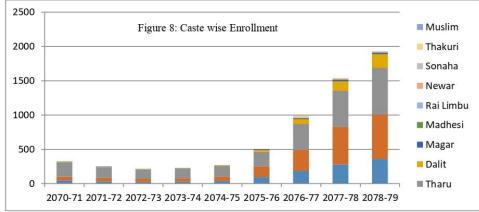
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B. Caste wise Enrollment Statistics

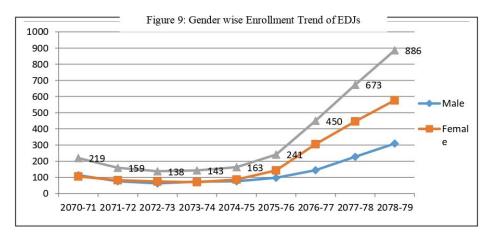
C. Enrollment Trend of Educationally Disadvantaged Janajatis (EDJs)

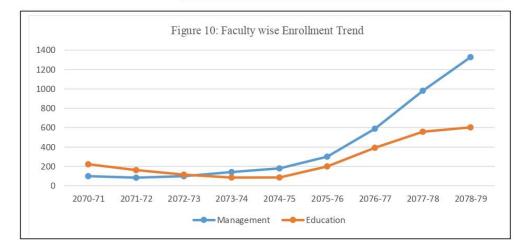

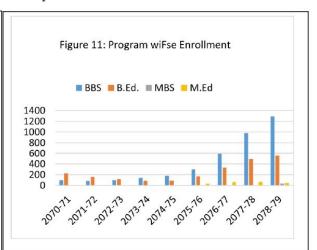

E. Gender-wise Enrollment in Different Programs

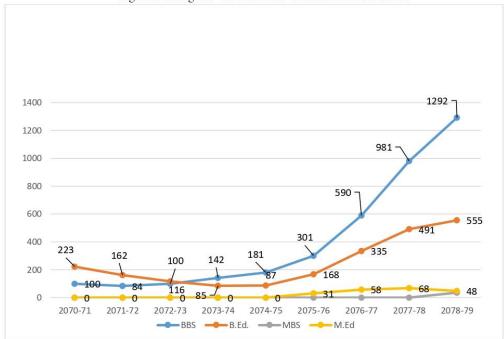


Figure 12: Program -wise Student Enrollment Growth Trend

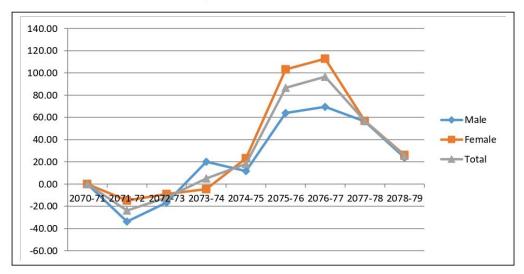


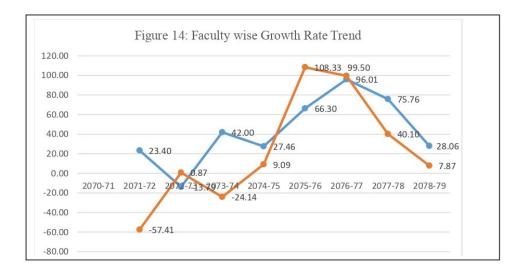
Figure 13: Growth Rate Trend

H. Faculty wise Student Enrollment Growth Rate Trend

Generally, faculty wise students' enrollment is increasing after the academic session: 2074/75 while as it was in negative trend till the academic session: 2073/074. The faculty wise enrollment is also continuously growing however growth rate is slowed down after 2076/77 due to different reasons and maturity of the institution. There was -27.35 % decrement in education faculty in 2071/72 where as increased to 128.74 % growth in 2075/76 and final growth rate is 7.87 %. 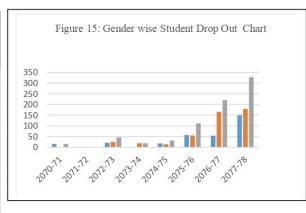


6.2 Student Drop out Situation

6.2.1 Total and Gender wise Student Drop out Situation

The drop out rate is shaped according to students' enrollment. As the number of students are low the drop out is also low and when students' enrollment is increased; drop out rate is also increased. The students drop out rate has been calculated on the basis of enrollment and no. of students appeared in the annual/final examination. The number of student enrolled is considered on the batch basis that have participated in the final exam. Thus, all number of enrolled students might not be counted in the year. There was no drop out in 2071/72 and the highest drop out was in 2077/78 when 328 students left out the campus. The highest growth rate is 22.40 % in 2074/75. On average drop out rate over 8 years has been found 14.08 %. The gender wise female students' drop out is higher than male students. The following figure shows the drop out scenario of BMC.

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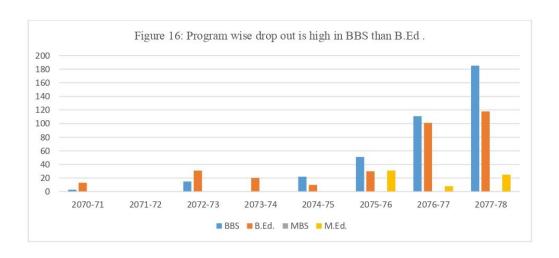

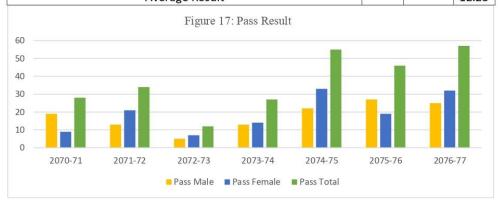

Student Teacher Ratio: 1931/25= 77.24:1 i.e. total no. of students is divided by total no. teachers.

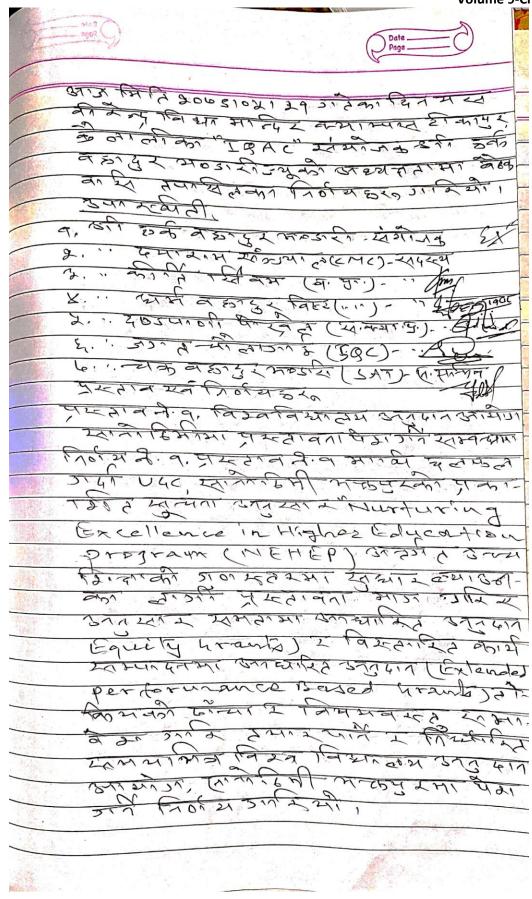

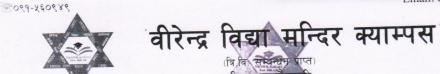
